The Sir Richard Williams Foundation is an independent organisation whose primary purpose is to strengthen Australia's national security by shaping and influencing policy decisions regarding Australia's defence with an emphasis on air power.

The Foundation also promotes national security policies that:

- promote the generation of coherent and sustainable combat power by Navy, Army and Air Force; particularly in a joint context, including through the wider Australian national scientific and support base.
- influence the evolving regional strategic environment in a manner favourable to Australia's security.

The Foundation aims to stimulate awareness, understanding and constructive debate on national security policies by conducting research, publishing papers, consulting with senior defence officials and industry representatives and hosting conferences and workshops.

No significant change in the nature of these activities occurred during the year.

Operating Result

The surplus/(loss) after providing for income tax for the financial year amounted to: \$45,866 and (\$107,958) for 2021.

Going Concern

Independent Auditor's Report to the Members

Report on the Audit of the 2022 Financial Report

Opinion

We have audited the financial report of The Sir Richard Williams Foundation Inc. (the association), which comprises the Committee's Report, Balance Sheet as at 30 June 2022, Income & Expenditure Statement for the year ended on that date, a summary of significant accounting policies and the certification by members of the committee on the annual statements giving a true and fair view of the financial position and performance of the association.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial report presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the association as at 30 June 2022 and of its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements and the requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Act (ACT) 1991*.

Basis for Opinion

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report

Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of this financial report.
